Paul Hanson convened the Board of Directors meeting December 19, 2013 at 11:30 AM EDST with a special presentation by Colonel Vince Tedesco. See below in St. Barbara & Molly Pitcher Committee.

Reports of Officers:

President. Paul Hanson – no comments First Vice President, John Huelsenbeck - no comments Second Vice-President, Bob Cuce – no comments Secretary, Dave McCray – no comments Treasurer, Allan Penwell – Allan indicated they would start treating product on the accrual basis of accounting and he will need an inventory from Duane and others as of December 31, 2013. Allan also asked that we approve Kallembach & Associates for another year for the audits. Bruce Geiger made a motion to approve using Kallembach & Associates for the audits again. Joe Belardo seconded the motion and was approved without dissent and thus approved. Allan will be retiring from his bank position on December 27th. Congratulations Allan! Financial Statements as of November 30, 2013 had been e-mailed to the board members prior to the Board meeting.

Dave McCray e-mailed the minutes to the Board of Directors before the meeting. However, the Board neglected to approve the September minutes and they need to be approved at the next meeting.

Membership Committee (Joe Belardo, Paul Kopsick):

Paul Kopsick stated we have over 300 paid dues for 2014 already. Paul asked we continue with the prior printing arrangement for additional rosters and he be giving a 25 cent increase per roster. The motion was made by John Huelsenbeck and seconded by Joe Belardo. No dissenting votes were cast and approved. Paul also asked that we watch the Kennedy Center Honors on CBS December 29th. Paul is part of the Honor Guard on the left side of the stage, back row with a red hat. The Honor Guard saluted the Presidential box and the President returned the salute.

Nominating Committee (Sam Hopkins, Joe Belardo):

Sam stated he had not received any nominations other than those discussed in September. Sam listed those running for office are John Huelsenbeck for President, Bob Cuce for First Vice-President, Paul Kopsick for Second Vice-President, Garry Severin for Secretary, Allan Penwell for Treasurer and Dave McCray will assume the Asst. Secretary position (nonvoting member). Ballots will go out with the Rosters since both are only for dues paying members.

Good Works Committee (Sam Hopkins, Bob Cuce & Bruce Geiger):

A discussion was held where to do our Good Works project in the DC area. At the end of the discussion Paul Hanson asked for a proposal and Bob Lauver made a motion to use the Fisher House in Bethesda, Maryland. Bruce Geiger seconded the motion and no dissenting votes were cast and thus approved. Joe Belardo provided the number as 301-295-5334. Bob and Sam will work out the details and make contact to find out what they need.

Publications/Historian Committee (Paul Kopsick):

A flyer will be sent out detailing the reunion information and will be available on the web site too. Also, the next newsletter will be sent out around the 3^{rd} week of January.

<u>Reunion Committee (Bob Lauver, Bruce Geiger, Mary</u> <u>Severin, Paul Hanson, Sam Hopkins, Dave McCray, Paul</u> <u>Kopsick & Joe Belardo):</u>

Paul Hanson asked Bruce Geiger to present the detail on the next reunion. Bruce stated he signed the contract today and it will be May 24 through May 29 as the departure date. The hotel will be the Doubletree Hilton in Crystal City, VA and it can accommodate all our needs. Bruce stated the cost will be \$109 plus a 13% tax and the rate is good 3 days prior and after the dates above for members extended stays. The cutoff for reservations is May 2nd, but may still be accommodated if room is available. We will get the standard 1 free room for every 40 room nights so we can gift these to members at the auction on the 28^{th} . There is a \$10 parking rate with in-out privileges. The room block guarantee by the Association is 80% of 360 room nights. We will have the complementary hospitality room, BOD meeting room and the Members Business Meeting room. There is a \$5,000 commitment for food and beverages for the Banquet on the 28th. Bruce also negotiated a \$17 breakfast buffet inclusive of tip and taxes, plus a 10% discount on all other restaurants in the hotel. We will be allowed to bring in our own drinks including alcohol drinks and snacks into the Hospitality room as long as they are purchased in Virginia. All Board of

Directors will be upgraded to a one bedroom suite. When the men are in the members meeting the Women's Auxiliary will have their ladies continental breakfast in the Hospitality room. There is a \$10 charge per lady to the Association. The hotel is 2 blocks from the Pentagon Metro. There are free shuttles to and from Regan airport and the hotel.

Bruce gave the following schedule for reunion: (See other portions of the newsletter for details.)

Joe Belardo is looking into having commercial passenger Vans available for trips into DC for individuals. There will be a small charge of \$5 per person. Joe is also working on our Monday Wall ceremony.

<u>Products Committee (Duane & Mary Gettler, Bruce</u> Geiger, Paul Kopsick & Bob Lauver):

Duane and Bob discussed Polo Shirts. It was mentioned that the order sheet has Polo T-shirts on it and should be changed to Polo shirts. Duane was asked about Mary's shoulder and he said it is doing fine, but still a little weak. Bruce will review the 50 Cal bottle openers and coins.

<u>Website Committee (Bob Lauver, Paul Kopsick, Allan</u> Penwell, Bob Cuce, Bruce Geiger, Robert Schmeisser):

Bob Lauver stated he will be having a meeting with Mojo Active after the first of the year. Bob's goal is to have the new web site up and running by March.

<u>St. Barbara & Molly Pitcher Committee (Vince Tedesco,</u> <u>Paul Hanson & Suzanne Tedesco):</u>

I added this new committee based on the following discussion. Vince Tedesco made a presentation for a proposal to be added. Since we are now members of the ADA Association, Vince has proposed that we adopt the use of their ancient artillery award called the St. Barbara award along with the ladies Molly Pitcher award. Vince told the history of the St Barbara and Molly Pitcher award. The St. Barbara award is made up of two parts: The first is an honorable award and is less demanding and anyone can be awarded. The second part is the Ancient award that can only be recommended by current Ancient award recipients. Vince has won the Ancient version of this award and has agreed to be the NDQSA representative.

The Molly Pitcher award is also less demanding and to be given to ladies. Suzanne Tedesco is a recipient of this award and will chair the Molly Pitcher group. As members are awarded they will become members of the committee. The award has a medal attached to a red ribbon and comes with a Certificate. It will be presented annually at the reunion. It was suggested we present 2 Duster, 2 Quad, 1 Searchlight, 1 Hawk and 1 or 2 to wives this year. The committee will make the final decision. There is a cost of approximately \$25 per award that will be paid by the NDQSA Treasury.

Paul Hanson requested a motion to adopt Vince's proposal to begin using our affiliation and membership in the ADA and

initiate giving this award to our membership. Bob Lauver made the motion to adopt Vince's recommendation. Sam Hopkins seconded the motion and no dissenting votes were cast. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Luke Clark asked Vince if he had a copy of the ADA association By-Laws. Vince said he has, but they need updating because of the move from Fort Bliss to Fort Sill. Vince will supply him a copy as soon as they are finalized. Paul Hanson asked about membership cards from the ADA. Paul Kopsick will work with Vince to give him the information so he can pursue the cards after the first of the year. He will try to have them ready to distribute at the reunion.

Dave McCray will obtain a new Post Office Box number after the first of the year. The official change will occur after the newsletter and the web site will be updated. Order of Saint Barbara From Wikipedia

The award is named for Saint Barbara, the patron saint of artillerymen. Saint Barbara day falls on December 4 and is traditionally recognized by a formal Dining-In or military ball, often involving presentations of the Order of Saint Barbara.



Order of Saint Barbara is a military honor society of the US for both the US Army and the US Marine Corps Artillery, including field artillery and Air Defense Artillery.

The Order of Saint Barbara is awarded through the U.S. Field Artillery Association (USFAA) and the Air Defense Artillery Association (ADAA) and has two levels:

- The Honorable Order of Saint Barbara is awarded to those individuals who have demonstrated the highest standards of integrity and moral character, displayed an outstanding degree of professional competence, served the Artillery with selflessness; and contributed to the promotion of the Artillery branch. The approval is reserved for O-5 Field Artillery commanders when no O-6 commander is available. They may approve the award for those in or associated with their commands. When there is no such Field Artillery commander available, the Commanding General of the United States Army Field Artillery Center and Fort Sill is the approving authority.
- The Ancient Order of Saint Barbara is reserved for those members of the artillery community who have achieved long-term, exceptional service to the artillery surpassing even their brethren in the Honorable Order of Saint Barbara. The

approving authority for this award is the Commanding General, United States Army Field Artillery Center and Fort Sill.

Order of Saint Barbara Medallion

Those awarded the Order of Saint Barbara receive a medallion attached to a red ribbon. The medallion for the Honorable Order is silver, the Ancient Order has a gold colored medallion. One side of the medallion has a cannon, the other a likeness of Saint Barbara standing by a tower with three windows. The medallion will be worn with the cannon side facing the chest and the bust of Saint Barbara facing out and in view. The Order of Saint Barbara should be worn only at Artillery functions such as Saint Barbara's Day celebrations, Artillery balls or Artillery dinings-in and dinings-out. Commanders, O-6 and above, may designate other occasions for wear as appropriate.

Molly Pitcher

The **Honorable Order of Molly Pitcher** is bestowed by the U.S. Field Artillery Association (USFAA) and the Air Defense Artillery Association (ADAA) to recognize women who have voluntarily contributed in a significant way to the improvement of the U.S. Field Artillery or Air Defense Artillery Communities. The award is named after Molly Pitcher who distinguished herself during the American revolutionary war

The Honorable Order of Molly Pitcher is also bestowed by the U.S. Field Artillery Association (USFAA) and the Air Defense Artillery Association (ADAA) to recognize women who have voluntarily contributed in a significant way to the improvement of the U.S. Field Artillery or Air Defense Artillery Communities. The approval is reserved for O-5 Field Artillery commanders when no O-6 commander is available. They may approve the award for those in or associated with their commands. When there is no such Field Artillery commander available, the Commanding General of the United States Army Field Artillery Center and Fort Sill is the approving authority

HOW TO ATTEND A REUNION - A PRIMER -

I have been involved in the planning and operation of NDQSA reunions for several years now and I am still amazed at the comments we have received from individuals that had been truly overwhelmed by the reunion events. Conversely I have seen guys walk in to the hospitality room, look around a bit and then leave, never to return. I wonder, why did they come in the first place and what did they expect?

Will I meet anybody I served with in Nam?



The answer is yes, no and maybe! If you are still in contact with buddies and coordinated ahead of time to attend a reunion, yes, they will be there. If you didn't, then the answer is likely no. Still there is always a chance that someone will walk in 'out of the blue' that served with you. It has happened and does still happen.

NDQSA has made it a point to move the reunions locations around the US and in major cities with the hopes of making it possible for all DQS vets to have a chance of attending a reunion. You have to remember that NDQSA is not made up of a single Army unit. It is composed of 14 different artillery units encompassing a <u>class of weapons</u>, Air Defense/Artillery that served nearly seven years. This is part of our uniqueness.

This year we are in Washington DC again, the most important city in the world for Vietnam Veterans with The Wall and Arlington Cemetery and all the nation's monuments and museums. We have purposely planned this reunion to coincide with Memorial Day so we can March as a group in the nationally televised parade down Constitution Avenue and ending up at the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial.

NDQSA is not a military 'sponsored' veterans group. DQS started as a bunch of guys from a single unit and has grown to become one of the largest and most respected Veterans groups in the country. Aside from the first AD/A units that trained and deployed together, we NDQSA vets largely had no real bond to our specific units. Most of us were drafted and traveled to and from Vietnam alone or maybe with a few guys from AIT. We served in small teams of 2 or crews of 5-6 and when we left Nam, we returned to a country that took out their frustrations with the Vietnam War on the men and women their country sent into harm's way. That caused many of us to suppress or hold our time in service as a dark time never to be acknowledged, let alone honored.

Well, this is our time now! Sure there have been a few parades and ceremonies around the country that paid the long overdue honor to Vietnam Vets, but we never got to march as a unit, as a battalion with our buddies.

This is the year! And with many of us in our 60's, 70's and 80's, this may well be the last chance we will have to bring together such a large contingent of AD/A Veterans in one place at one time. NDQSA will be marching and you are all invited to attend the reunion and it is up to you to contact and invite your buddies. Still if you come alone you will not be disappointed.

How can I get guys to attend a reunion?

NDQSA's Historian has spent a decade expanding and refining our Roster. It is sorted out by unit and by year. Active (dues paying) members get a copy and can see who has been located from your unit and timeframe. It is not complete by any stretch but it is a starting point. Look in your old paperwork and photo albums for names and hometowns and contact the Historian for help.

Do I come alone or can I bring my family?



NDQSA prides itself as a family oriented group. These reunions are as much for them as it is for you. It is not a bunch of warhorses boozing it up telling war stories (well maybe just a few). Wives and children are just as much if not more interested in learning about what it was like to serve in Vietnam. The hospitality room is set up with displays and memorabilia. We have water, sodas and beer available with a donation jar to help cover costs. There is no 'cash bar' with hard liquor and members monitor each other's behavior.

If you are coming as a single, that is fine too. You can even try to hook up with another single and share a room to help keep your costs down. Contact the Historian with your schedule if you are looking for a roommate.

What do I wear?

You can wear whatever it is you are comfortable wearing. There are a few events where shorts and t-shirts are not appropriate (Remembrance Ceremony and Banquet) but other than "no shoes, no shirt, no service" you are good to go. NDQSA has various polos, t-shirts, jackets and hats to help identify you as a NDQSA Vet.

What should I bring to a reunion?

Well, certainly bring any photo albums, paperwork and memorabilia you have from your tour in Nam. There are tables where these items can be displayed. If you already have one of the NDQSA History Books don't forget to bring it so guys can sign it.

NDQSA has wonderful evening programs of fundraising that includes daily "50-50" drawings and on the last night we have Chinese and live auctions of items brought by members. These are generally handmade or patriotic items but it is also a chance to 're-gift' that unwanted Christmas present to a good cause. These auctions have become one of the highlights of the reunion. Be sure that when you come that you stay for the Wednesday evening program. You can drop off your auction item(s) at the sign-in desk.

What if I am flying in for the WDC reunion?

If you can, try to fly in to DCA - Regan National Airport. It is located about a mile from the hotel and the hotel has a free shuttle. If you have to fly in to IAD -Dulles International Airport you will be 20+ miles to the west and will have to take an expensive cab or shuttle to get to the hotel in Crystal City.

If I live nearby how do I plan to participate?

Remember, being local can still mean that you have more than an hour commute each way and have to deal with traffic and parking. Too often have I seen local guys pop in for a few hours and to never partake in any of the scheduled activities. You are defeating the whole purpose of our gathering...if you do not gather! These are suggestions for people that live near WDC.

While you typically will not choose to partake in the general sightseeing of Saturday and Sunday, as it is the weekend you should at least come in to the hotel in the evenings to meet with your brother members. Plan on a few hours (at least one night) to see who is here and to make plans for dinners, etc. with buddies and to make new contacts!! You will not regret it.

Do sign up for the Monday Parade and Remembrance Ceremony. Park for the day at the hotel and take the bus with the group. It is much more fun and practical than trying to find a parking spot in downtown DC.

Do sign up for the trip to the Marine Museum and the afternoon programs at the Tank Farm. It will be a coordinated daylong event with lots of hands-on time with a Duster, Quad and Searchlight, plus several surprises. Do not miss this!! Park at the hotel.

Now this is going to sound odd, but I really suggest that you <u>make a hotel reservation</u> for one or two nights, at least Wednesday the 28th. If you are local, and only partake in the day activities, you will not get full experience of the Hospitality Room. You are cheating yourself. Consider it a special night out. Bring the wife and take her to dinner. Seriously, this may be the only reunion you attend. Don't shortchange yourself.

What do I do in the Hospitality Room?



First of all, you need to show up. There will be a registrations table where you can verify your account and make any changes to planned activities. There is also a sign-in book that has been part of our reunions for many years. Please sign in one line per family. List your hotel room number in case we need to locate you. If local please leave a cell phone number. If you have not pre-registered you can do it then, and if you still need to pay your 2014 dues, you can do it then. You can also drop off any items you have for the auction/fundraising. You will be given a name tag on a lanyard so others can read your name, unit and hometown. There will be a products table manned by volunteers where you can buy NDQSA items and apparel from our inventory. The \$20/25 registration fee helps defer the cost of name tags, lanyards, and other reunion related handouts.

The Historian will set up in a corner of the room and he will help you place any items you brought for display. He will also ask about any photos or paperwork you might have that he can borrow to archive. He will have boxes of reference material on hand and be available to discuss personal stories and inquiries for information. He will have little stickers that you can place on your name badge that further indicates your unit and history. The Historian will also hold a commemorative stamp cancellation for this reunion. Donations accepted.

There will be tables and chairs where guys and their wives will be sitting and talking and sharing stories and photo albums. Some of the tables will be full and some will not. Returning members will probably be grouped together but that does not mean they are not interested in meeting you. Quite the contrary! As hard as it might seem to some, all you have to do is walk up to a table and say "Hello, my name is and I served with this unit at this time." From then on you are all 'old friends'.

What is a "50-50" drawing?

A "50-50" is a way that groups raise funds for projects and programs. A fifty-fifty is held at least once an evening. Tickets can be purchased for a set amount and at drawing time, the pot is split in half (typically >\$100) and a number drawn. The winner can then claim their share of the pot.

How do the raffles and auctions work?



We typically have two types of auctions: Chinese and Live and also 'lot drawings'. The auctions are set up on Wednesday afternoon for completion that evening.

Lot drawings are set up whereby most of the donated items are scaled by general value and assigned a number. A plastic cup is also given that number and placed nearby. You will be able to purchase colored tickets in different denominations which you write your name on that you can then place in a cup. When the drawings begin, the name drawn is the winner of the item. (Hint: bring a bunch of mailing labels from home to use on your tickets). This is a lottery drawing, no one knows who wins until the name is drawn. The Chinese auction is set up with a donated item and a bid sheet. These are typically 'higher end' donations that are not appropriate for the lot drawings. The item will be described, a starting price set and then people will come up and review the price and if they want to make a bid, they will write in their bid and name. Anyone can make a higher bid until the auction is closed (which will be announced ahead of time). The winning bid must be honored and be paid for at the sign-in desk.

Live auctions are reserved for 'special' items. Everyone gets to bid and at least once there will be a ridiculous bidding war by 2-3 guys for some minor item. Last year it was a web-belt and holster. Other more serious and prestigious items, like quilts, and bladed weapons have garnered extremely generous bids. Another aspect during these 'tribute' auctions is for members to make 'donation bid' to 'pump up' the final bid for an honored participant.

In the past, this fundraising was a key way to support the Gold Star Mother Program and thousands of dollars were raised. NDQSA currently tracks these funds for use in special projects and vehicle restoration programs.

Also on the last evening, we will hold a drawing for a one-night rebate on your hotel bill. All attendees registered at the DoubleTree will be eligible. The number of free rooms drawn is dependent on the number of rooms reserved by NDQSA attendees. Good Luck!

What about the Awards Banquet?



The Awards banquet begins at noon right after the annual business meeting on Wednesday the 28th. This is when we all assemble for a buffet style lunch and get to listen to guest speakers and to hand out awards and commendations to members and officers. This year we will have another two-star general, a former 1LT from 5/2d who will address the membership. We will also begin an annual program with the announcing of "Order of Santa Barbara" and "Molly Pitcher" awardees. The current NDQSA President, Paul D. Hanson will then formally turn over the title to the new incoming President which will have been announced in the morning's annual business meeting.

What about the Annual Business meeting? Why do I have to go to it?



The annual business meeting is the only time in the year when the members and the board of directors can get together to discuss and vote on association matters. There will be the official tallying of the votes on the 2014 slate of officers (executive officers) and the announcing of the next President of the association. We will also be nominating and voting on future reunion locations and announcing the location of the next reunion. There will be committee reports and discussions of projects and programs effecting NDQSA. We strongly encourage all 'local' NDQSA members to come in early on Wednesday and participate. This is your association and the BOD strives to be inclusive and responsive to the membership.

The wives that are attending the reunion will have a social gathering on their own with a Continental Breakfast in the Hospitality Room at the same time.

What about the parade? Are there options for those that cannot march?



We want this to be a special event for everyone and we do not want to exclude anyone, which for health reasons cannot make the mile long march from partaking in the day's events. If you cannot walk you will be able to ride in one of the many vintage jeeps and trucks that will be accompanying us. Family members can march too!

Certainly anyone can set up along the parade route to cheer the marchers in the parade. If you want to be part of the parade we will work to get you into the parade. Based on last year's event, we will be waiting in a staging area on Madison Ave near the Art Museum.

We are calling the march, "The Lost Convoy---Brothers on the Wall". We plan to have each marcher carry one of the 211 rubbings of a name on The Wall from our AD/A units. This way we will honor them by having them 'in spirit' march with us. If you lost a buddy in Nam we will try to make their name available to you so you can march together. Pretty cool, eh!

Why were the normal days for our reunions changed this year?
