ITEMS LEFT AT THE WALL Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund



Text of the handwritten inscription upon the exterior helmet surface is transcribed in full, as follows;

"•......A HELMET LIKE THIS HELPED KEEP A PART OF ME ALIVE - SO I WOULD ALWAYS REMEMBER YOU - YOUR JOKES, THE WAY YOU LAUGHED, THE STORIES OF YOUR FAMILIES AND YOUR HOME. / WE SHARED SOMETHING NOBODY CAN TAKE AWAY "VIETNAM". / I'LL NEVER FORGET YOU. / THOSE OF YOU WHO HAVE BEEN TURNING THIS HELMET AROUND TO READ IT. / PLEASE TURN TO THE NEXT VETERAN YOU SEE AND SAY "WELCOME HOME" - THANKS JOE BELARDO "C" - BTRY 1ST - 44TH DUSTERS 67-68 CAMP J.J. CARROLL ROCK

PILE, CALU, KHE SANH, CONTHIEN -DONG HA - KHE GIO BRIDGE, ROUTE 9 -DUSTERS - QUADS AND SEARCHLIGHTS."

ITEM SUMMARY

Military issue, M1 combat helmet with handwritten inscription. The inscription is composed is concentric rings (proceeding from the crown to the brim) upon the exterior surface of the helmet shell, and is from, "JOE BELARDO "C" - BTRY 1ST - 44TH DUSTERS 67-68". In the inscription, Mr. Belardo states that, "A HELMET LIKE THIS HELPED KEEP A PART OF ME ALIVE - SO I WOULD ALWAYS REMEMBER YOU", recounts the shared experience of serving in Vietnam with his comrades in arms, and closes with the plea, "THOSE OF YOU WHO HAVE BEEN TURNING THIS HELMET AROUND TO READ IT. / PLEASE TURN TO THE NEXT VETERAN YOU SEE AND SAY "WELCOME HOME" ". The artifact was left at The Wall by U.S. Army and Vietnam veteran Joe Belardo in November 1995.

EMAILS AND INTERNET COMMUNICATIONS

To: Joe (Belardo).

I just finished reading your book and found it very compelling. After reading about being the guy who manned the guns I thought you would like to hear from one who was under the guns.

In 1967 the 3d Battalion of the 39th Infantry (Army) was established in the Mekong Delta south of Saigon. We had two Twin 40s assigned to us (5/2d) acting as base security and road guards. In early 1967 I was traveling to an forward observation post 100 clicks from our southern berm. Halfway to that post I was engaged by a sniper who pinned me down in the roadway. He was splashing bullets close to me and I was in a very exposed place. All of a sudden I heard the tracks clanging on the road and the Twin 40 topped the rise to my right. He eyeballed the situation and I fired a couple of tracers to where I was receiving the fire from. The gun opened up and imprinted forever into my memory the sight and sound as the rounds impacted and the foliage blasted into the air. This was followed by the fast reactionary force investigating. No sniper was found and we returned to a normal day. Never met the skilled dustermen to express my thanks so I wish you will accept them in their behalf.

We in the 554th really appreciated having you guys around while we went about our duties. Thank you for that.

Thank you for the wonderful email and thank you for reading me book.

We had three (3) Duster and Quad 50 Battalions in Vietnam.

As you know by my book from I was in 1st / 44th which handled the DMZ down to Hue City In the Central Highlands there was 4th/ 60th In the south was 5th/2nd

We all had somewhat of a different duty assignment. I am glad that we helped you on a very scary day and thrilled that you survived Vietnam.

They didn't find the sniper because the 40mm probably made him into dust.

Hi Paul, Nelson Kelly here.

First off since going to a few reunions I have met a few Brothers I was stationed with in Vietnam. I will be honest, I was completely 'mind-blank' pretty much to what happened and when during my tour. I was stationed on Hill 65 with a G-29 searchlight unit assigned to a Marine Company. I had a choice at end of tour to extend 30 days or get transferred to a different unit for rotation reasons. I think someone called it "the McNamara shuffle". I opted for transfer and ended up with a Duster unit. Didn't even know what a Duster was. My OJT was: stand up, exposed from the waist up and keep dropping 4 round clips in to the guns. Why I didn't extend 30 days I don't know?

We did some convoy escorts and would get to areas that were under alert for attack and did perimeter defense. We could fire without permission from higher ups as artillery needed. I remember one such event where we were sent to a Seabee compound that came under alert and I could not believe how nice this place was. Buildings with screens, a flower garden by the main

entrance that I was told later on was the CO's pride and joy. We asked if we could get some chow and was told the CO said we didn't have a voucher for that. WHAT? We been living on c-rations and you can't give us some chow and we are protecting you?

Later on some Seabees brought us some chow by our track on the base perimeter. Nothing happened but I was amazed that this base was so nice. One thing that did happen was one of the Seabees gave me some reel to reel recorded tapes. I had purchased a Sony reel to reel tape recorder with built in speakers in Danang but no tapes to play so I was loving life.

After this came the Tet offensive and we escorted what I was told was the first convoy to get through to the MACV compound at Hue. Came under attack a couple of times and several 2½ ton trucks with canvas covers, loaded with Marines were hit bad. The most horrible thing I saw was a family, MamaSan, PapaSan and Baby San dead on side of road next to their push cart caught trying to escape and pigs eating them. God that was horrible.

Going through Hue I was amazed that this was at one time a beautiful City before Tet offensive. Street lights, sidewalks etc. Burned out now. We made it to MACV compound and was positioned by the bank of Perfume River with orders to fire at will. Next day a second Looie shows up and says "we are going to attack" WTF ?? As we were going down a street in Hue the track in front of us took a direct rocket direct hit.

While at Nashville reunion I met Floyd "Red" Seratte and he told me he was on this very track. That was very emotional for him and me. I don't know how many survived that. I thought the RPG round went through the turret but Red said it went through the hatch door.

Oh by the way did I tell you that when we left the Seabee compound we *accidently* ran through someone's flower garden?

NOTE: If you remember in the last newsletter there was a photo of D-132 "Reds" track with Willie Wong on the back next to a wounded soldier. That photo may have captured the incident that Nelson is describing here...amazing!

Opens June 4th 2020


Ft. Belvoir, VA

The <u>National Museum of the United States Army</u> at Ft. Belvoir, VA is scheduled to open its doors to the public on June 4, 2020, while NDQSA has their 38th annual reunion in Norfolk, VA.

The National Museum of the United States Army (<u>TheNMUSA</u>) will be the first museum to cover the Army's entire 244-year history. There are other branch-specific or conflict-specific museums such as the Infantry Museum at Fort Benning, Georgia, and the National World War II Museum in New Orleans.

Like other D.C.-area museums, admission for the Fort Belvoir, Virginia, museum will be open for free to the public on a timed-entry ticket system. Museum officials expect as many as 750,000 visitors in the facility's first year. Make plans to stop by on your way back from Norfolk.


The museum will tell the Army's story through soldier stories. The narrative begins with the earliest militias and continues to present day.



FROM THE INTERNET

Dennis Walden to 23rd and 54th Artillery Groups & Subordinate Artillery Battalions Viet Nam

I was looking through some of my 1970-1971 Vietnam photos scanned from 35 mm slides, and noticed what appears to be crewmen's names written on these two M42 40 mm Dusters. Photo quality is poor compared to today's digital photography, but I can make out JOHN, MICK in front, and REESE on the 2nd Duster. Does anyone recognize the names or faces of any of the crewmen shown in these two Dusters? One Duster is identified as US ARMY 12C 349, which I mistakenly took to mean 12th Cavalry. You can probably shed some light on that. They were stationed in support of 554th Combat Engineer Battalion at Thunder III in 1970. I hope we can ID some of the crewmen and get copies of the photos to them. I know they would appreciate it. I also had photos of two 5 ton quad 50 cal. trucks, but those slides went AWOL before I got around to scanning them. If they turn up later I'll post those too.

Historian's comments: At first I did not realize that the same Duster was in both photos. Note 12C346, the Duster with the camouflage pattern on it is in both images. I remembered that camo painting was rarely done and when I searched my archives from the 5/2d I located a photo of D-112 in Richard Shand's album and 'lo and behold' the driver's name on the front of the track is "Reese". Bingo! Hopefully Richard can shed some light on the events? Maybe the first track is D-111? If you have any info, contact the Historian.

BRICKMANIA NEWS

What retired military weapons or vehicles would still be effective if brought back to the modern battlefield?



I actually think the M42 Duster would be extremely effective at urban warfare. Its dual 40 Bofors cannons might not be strong enough to pierce through the armor main battle tanks, however they would be more than capable of decimating enemy firing positions in brick and concrete buildings. The range of its 40 mm shells would make useful for supporting infantry assaults from outside the range of small arms, although it would still be vulnerable to anti-tank guided missiles. The M42 would be able to send more firepower down range in a shorter amount of time than any main battle tank in service, given that each of its 40 mm cannons has a rate of fire of 120 rpm.

Additionally, conventional tanks have occasionally gotten into trouble in urban environments, where their guns could not elevate enough to fire at the enemy. The Russians learned this the hard way at the Battle of Grozny in the first Chechen War. However, given that the M42 was designed as an anti-aircraft gun, it would have no problem elevating its cannons to shoot back at soldiers firing on it from rooftops.

Editor's response: All well and good, but try standing up out in the open to load the guns. Enemy snipers would have a field day picking off the crews. The guys that went into Hue during Tet would have something to add to the discussion.

Veteran's Day 2019

The weather was perfect in Washington DC for the event. Attendees at The Wall today were NDQSA President Bob Cuce; Vice President - Paul Kopsick; Director - Bruce Geiger: and members - Al Hansen; Paul Peters; Richard Burmood; Ray Villaneuva; Rich Liebendorfer and Barry Willever. Nancy Smoyer was a Donut Dolly and volunteers each year at The Wall. Barry Willever was met by a new veteran that was on a 'Freedom Flight' from Utah, Dennis Andrus who saw Barry's NDQSA Hat and Quad-50 Jacket and introduced himself. The typical statement of most new contacts is: "I never knew you guys existed!"...well welcome to NDQSA Dennis.

VVMF works with the Department of Defense to make sure The Wall is accurate. Names are added for those service members who have met the Department of Defense criteria for addition to The Wall, having sustained wounds in Vietnam from which they eventually perished. No new names were added to The Wall this year.

Beside each name on The Wall is a symbol designating status. The diamond symbol denotes that the service member is known dead or presumed dead. The cross symbol denotes that a service member was missing or prisoner status when The Wall was built in 1982 and remain unaccounted for today. When a service member is repatriated, the diamond is superimposed over the

cross. In 2018, nine service members were repatriated and those service members will be officially welcomed home at the ceremony.

Talked with the folks at Ft Sill. The 4/60 will be activated on 4 October 2020 at Ft Sill. I informed them that many of us old 4/60 troops wanted to be a part of the activation activities.

HERALDIC ITEMS

COAT OF ARMS 60th ADA



Shield: Per fess embattled sable and gules fimbriated or a pile in bend of the third the lower portion obscured by the second tincture, in sinister chief a mullet of the third. (I have no idea what this sentence says!)

Crest: On a wreath of the colors, or and sable, a carabao skull sable horned or.

Motto: Coelis Imperamus (We Rule the Heavens).

Symbolism: The shield is divided

horizontally, the dividing line embattled to represent defense. The lower half of the shield is red for artillery; the upper half black and gold significant of service in the Orient. A searchlight beam symbolizes the never-ending vigilance the organization exercises in searching for enemy aircraft. The star has a double significance. It is symbolic of Texas, the Lone Star State, where the unit was reorganized after World War I, and its battleground in the sky.



The <u>carabao</u> horns are symbolic of service in the Philippine Islands. (Note: Ironically, the carabao looks like the typical water buffalo found in Vietnam. Ha!)

Absorbed 1 August 1946 by Battery B, 60th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion. (Battery B, 60th Coast Artillery, redesignated 1 August 1946 as Battery B, 60th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion, and activated at Fort Bliss, Texas; redesignated 7 December 1949 as Battery B, 60th Antiaircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion, Mobile; redesignated 27 July 1950 as Battery B, 60th Antiaircraft Artillery Battalion; inactivated 17 June 1957 at South Hampton, England.)

Former Battery F, 60th Coast Artillery, reconstituted 12 August 1958 in the Regular Army and redesignated as Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 4th Missile Battalion, 60th Artillery (organic elements concurrently constituted). Battalion activated 1 September 1958 at Midway, Washington. Inactivated 15 December 1961 at Redmond, Washington. Redesignated 25 April 1966 as the 4th Battalion, 60th Artillery. Activated 25 June 1966 at Fort Bliss, Texas. Redesignated 1 September 1971 as the 4th Battalion, 60th Air Defense Artillery. Inactivated 31 July 1972 at Fort Lewis, Washington.
